Welcome Back ~ Term 4

Welcome back to term 4. Term 4 is traditionally a very busy term as we conclude and celebrate the planning of one year while simultaneously planning for another. I sincerely thank the amazing team that surround me as I leave this busy term in their hands. The backfilling of the Education Director position was unexpected, and too good an opportunity for me to turn down. I look forward to supporting the school within this position and being a part of the end of year celebrations upon my return in week 9. Some of the planning for 2025 has been ongoing for much of this year, in particular a review of the structure of the learning day and investigating ways of ensuring optimal learning conditions. Research and experience shows that the most focused learning occurs in the morning and that children learn best when the day is broken up with scheduled movement breaks and opportunities for refueling the brain with food and water. Therefore, next year we will begin the year by trialing a new day structure as developed by staff and approved by Governing Council.

The day timetable will be as follows:

8:50am - 10:00

10:00 - 11:00

11:00 – 11:20 (Morning recess)

11:20 - 12:30

12:30 – 1:00 (Lunch play)

1:00 – 1:10 (Lunch eating)

1:00 - 2:00

2:00 - 2:15 (Afternoon recess)

2:15 - 3:15

Some points to note and consider

- The learning day will begin 5 minutes earlier than it currently does
- Students will have more opportunities to snack and have a movement break, optimising learning
- Lunch eating will occur after the play break, limiting food wastage as students will not be leaving lunch in order to play. This eating time will be focused and consistent across classes.
- Essentially the canteen will run as it currently does, with the exception of no over the counter sales at lunch, as this will continue to be food preparation time, these items will be able to be purchased through the ordering system. Frozen cups will no longer be on the menu, but icy poles will remain an option. The canteen will not be open during the afternoon recess.

Planning for class structures, class placement and staffing is well underway. Please be reminded to submit any requests regarding class placement in writing by October 18.

Learning buddy preferences need to be returned to current class teachers by Monday 21 October. Learning buddy preferences are a list of students who enhance your child's learning and wellbeing.



The front of the school is a 'No Parking' zone along the entire length of the school front, from the top gate to the pedestrian gate near the mail box.

NO PARKING No Parking No Stopping

You must not park your vehicle in an area where a 'NO PARKING' sign applies, unless:

- · You are dropping off or picking up passengers or goods.
- You do not leave the vehicle unattended that is move more than three metres away
- · You complete the dropping off or picking up as soon as possible in any case, within two minutes.

Please note: a NO STANDING sign has the same meaning as a NO STOPPING sign.

PARKING SAFELY AROUND SCHOOLS

In an effort to provide a safer environment for everyone, City of Mount Gambier Council patrols schools throughout the school term and aims to educate drivers of the road rules and what the signs mean around schools.

PARKING CONCERNS IN SCHOOL AREAS

As it is not practical for schools to provide enough parking for everyone, it is the drivers responsibility to park their car legally and to help ease the parking issues whilst keeping everyone safe.

To help keep our children safe, it's important for drivers to:

- Slow down in school zones, during school times
- Be extra cautious around schools
- Be aware that young children can be unpredictable and difficult to see.

Children can stay safe by:

- · Learning about road safety
- Practicing crossing the road with parents and caregivers.



WHY DO WE HAVE PARKING RESTRICTIONS AROUND SCHOOLS?

The safety of all children is paramount.
Unlawful parking in schools areas is a major hazard and parking infringement notices may be issued for incorrect, unlawful or dangerous parking.

City of Mount Gambier aims to ensure our roads are safe, and traffic flows smoothly. Due to the chaotic nature of traffic around schools at peak times, streets can be dangerous for children who have not fully developed their cognitive abilities. Their perception, judgement and awareness of potentially dangerous situations is not adequately developed to enable them to deal with traffic. Children tend to follow by example, it's up to you encourage good road sense.

SAFETY CONCERNS IN AND AROUND SCHOOLS

- · Speeding motorists
- Parking and stopping on footpaths
- Parking and stopping across driveways
- Parking and stopping on median strips
- · Disregard of parking signs

BE RESPONSIBLE, CHILDREN'S SAFETY IS IN ALL OF OUR HANDS

- Observe and learn what each parking sign means.
- Plan your drop off so that you can arrive early.
- Park on the school side if possible so your child does not need to cross the road.
- When out walking, practice the "Stop" "Look" "Listen" and "Think" rule each time you cross the road.
- Walk or cycle to school.

It is your responsibility as a child's caregiver, to model safe behavior, whilst teaching and guiding them about these important road safety rules.

Always be aware of children, they can be unpredictable.



WHAT DO THE PARKING SIGNS MEAN?

No Stopping Zone or continuous yellow line edge on road

You cannot stop in this area. A vehicle cannot stop to drop off or pick up passengers. This restriction is in place 24 hours a day.

Offence expiation fee (Stopping Zone): \$102 (Yellow Line): \$104

No Parking Zone

You must stay within 3 metres of your car at all times. You may briefly assist your child from the vehicle.

Offence expiation fee: \$85

Obstructing Driveway

Obstructing access to and from a footpath, driveway etc. A driver must not stop on a road in a position that obstructs access by vehicles or pedestrians

Offence expiation fee: \$85

Disabled Parking Permit Zone

Whether in car parks or along streets, disabled parking areas, are designated for those only with a disabled permit, where a valid permit must be displayed. These permits are available from the Motor Registration Division of the Department for Transport.

Offence expiation fee: \$397

Parking longer than indicated

A driver must not park continuously on a length of road, or in a rea, to which a permissive parking sign applies, for longer than the time indicated by information on the sign.

Offence expiation fee: \$56

Bus Zone and Taxi Zones

Specific parking zones are designated for special service vehicles, such as buses and taxis, and must be left available for the vehicles stated.

Offence expiation fee: \$140
